Prostate Cancer UK have launched four new on-line forums aimed at four specific groups of men (and their partners/families) with prostate cancer.

Dear Members,

Just wanted to let you know that Prostate Cancer UK have launched four new on-line forums aimed at four specific groups of men (and their partners/families) with prostate cancer. These are;

Young men still employed or not yet reached pension age

This is a section for younger men who are below state pension age, men who have young or dependent children, or for whom the option of having or not having children is a factor in their choice of treatment.

African & African Caribbean men

This is a section for African and African Caribbean men with prostate cancer. We know that although there are some dedicated support groups for African/African Caribbean men in the community we know that very few attend general prostate cancer support groups despite the high incidence of prostate cancer within the African/African Caribbean community.

Gay & Bisexual men

This is a section for gay and bisexual men with prostate cancer. We know that there are a small number of support groups across the country specifically for gay and bisexual men with prostate cancer but we know that there will be men who will find it difficult to attend these groups. We also know that the vast majority of men attending general prostate cancer support groups identify as heterosexual. We want to create a space where men can talk about some of the issues that are important to them but they may not be able to share in a face to face group.

Transgender women

This is a section for transgender women with prostate cancer. We know that transgender women with prostate cancer are unlikely to attend a face to face support group. Given the likely small numbers of people affected, an online community may be an easier way for people to share experiences and support with others.

We know that some of the younger men, African & African Caribbean men, Gay & Bisexual men and Transgender woman may find it difficult to access support from existing support groups for a variety of reasons. We also know that people benefit from sharing experiences and concerns with others who have had similar experiences and we wanted to offer a space where people can hopefully connect with others to do that. We are not blocking access for anyone else, but we respectfully ask those who don't self-identify as one of the four categories not to post on these forums in order to keep the space focused on those it's intended for.

The forums can be found here http://community.prostatecanceruk.org/ under 'specific groups'. We will be trialling these groups over a 6 month period. Of course the non specific online community and forums are also still available **Http://community.prostatecanceruk.org**/ As part of this community, you can talk about whatever you want, from diagnosis to dealing with treatment. Simply browse the conversations to join one, or start your own if you'd prefer. Its very easy to access and get involved in any of the forums by registering an email address and user name.

"Track your PSA" tool

Here is an opportunity for those patients interested in following their prostate treatment history. A urologist based at Cambridge that we have worked with before has developed a PSA Tracker. This is a simple tool to empower patients who wish to follow their progress, and it supports regular monitoring and tracking. You are able to enter PSA results, treatments and reminders, as well as viewing trends over time. It is also possible for you to allow health care providers to view your data, should you wish to. Under trial for the next two months, the developers have offered it to any members of Tackle who wish to assess its value and help with feedback. The STAMPEDE prostate cancer trial:docetaxel and zoledronic acid results for patients
